

Kia Ora and greetings to parents, whanau and friends of Tauriko School,

Well, we have reached the end of Term 1, 2011 together! I have really enjoyed my first term at Tauriko School. As a staff we are extremely proud of, and grateful for, the supportive, open and transparent relationship that exists between the staff and the school community. I have particularly appreciated the positive manner in which parents/caregivers have approached the school recently about such a wide range of issues. This relationship enables staff to feel supported in their professional role in educating your children and part of a strong partnership around student learning.

School Uniform

Recently we asked through the newsletter that children wear the school polar fleece and long black pants when leaving the school on school trips. Our thoughts around this were that in the winter term we wanted all children to be easily identified as Tauriko students for safety reasons. In the winter term with other sweatshirts over top of the school polo-shirt, children are not always easily identifiable.

However, I have received feedback from six families that this is quite an expense if the children choose not to wear their polar fleece at school and only choose to wear it if they leave the school grounds – which may only be two or three times a term. They also mentioned if the uniform was compulsory this would not be an issue and suggested it is time to review this.

I think these families have some very valid points. In the strategic plan, we had planned to review the uniform next year so it may be timely to bring this review forward to this year and survey the community to see what the majority position around this is.

So... for now we will maintain the status quo with the school expectation around the polo-shirt only and parents can choose to purchase the polar fleeces for winter for school trips should they wish to do so. These can be pre-ordered through Kay in the office.

School Charter

Our new school charter has been sent to the Ministry of Education for approval. This has been developed using both internal review processes within the school and external review feedback from ERO. Staff, children, and the parent community have all had input into designing a charter that reflects our vision together for Tauriko School. I want to thank all of those parents and family members who supported the staff in developing a vision we can be proud of and that gives us clear direction for all decisions we make over the next few years.

Behaviour Management procedures

This term staff have been reviewing our Behaviour Management procedures. Throughout the term we have also had the opportunity to talk to a variety of parents around student behaviour when incidents have arisen. I have been most impressed with the positive way in which parents have worked with staff to ensure issues around behaviour management are dealt with consistently and fairly for all concerned. Staff have also worked with parents to put support into place for children should they require this.

Bullying is one behaviour that at times we need to deal with as a school. Staff have been looking at this a little more closely this term, which is also timely due to the public interest in this nationally at the moment. We have a definition of bullying developed which you will find in the Behaviour Management procedures. Bullying is a term that can be used to label many behaviours and we need to be careful that we don't use this too lightly, not all negative behaviour is bullying.

Curriculum changes for Term 2

Our recent ERO visit has highlighted the need for the school to continue to address the way the New Zealand Curriculum is delivered by our school. This is more than just an element of style and ERO agree with the Senior Management Team and the staff regarding concerns about the significant amount of time spent in some classes with students involved in self-selected play – not linked to clear learning goals, or involving direct teacher input.

This self-selected play is linked to documentation in the school around Te Whariki, the Early Childhood curriculum. As a primary school we are responsible for delivering the New Zealand Curriculum and student achievement is aligned to this. This recommendation is not a surprise to us. The Senior Management Team and Staff are working to address some aspects of this immediately. There will be a few changes made to how the curriculum is delivered at our school next term.

Other changes around the design of our school's curriculum will take place over the next twelve to eighteen months. These changes will make shifts in student achievement, with our first focus being around the tools of learning – reading, writing and mathematics.

Next term:

- ④ The school timetable will look different with learning times happening between **8:30am – 10:00am, 10:20am – 11:50am, and 12:30pm – 2:30pm**. This means learning in the morning will be for three hours and learning in the afternoon will be for two hours. Reading, writing and mathematics will all be taught in the morning and the other areas of the curriculum will be integrated in this time as appropriate and taught in the afternoon.
- ④ Developmental equipment is being stored in resource areas and equipment will be accessed by teachers, when it is appropriate, to support learning outcomes for students. Some equipment will be used outside before school, during morning tea and lunch breaks.
- ④ Cooking will not happen each week for students as it has previously. It will happen at times throughout the year when it supports learning outcomes for students based on a variety of aspects of the New Zealand Curriculum eg writing recipes, production and processes within Technology, healthy eating, measurement in mathematics. Therefore, \$7.50 per pupil will be returned to families. Kay will organise this to happen early next term. At times when teachers do use cooking to enhance student learning, this will be covered from curriculum budgets. In the time leading up to Ag Day, as we do for other events, families may be asked for some funding to support cooking activities related to this event.
- ④ All those **wonderful parents/whanau** who have supported cooking sessions.. we have other plans for you!!! We will be introducing some new programmes to support learning in the classroom and we would like to train parents to support student learning in reading with one of these programmes called "Pause, Prompt, Praise". A Resource Teacher of Learning and Behaviour (RTL B) will work in the school next term to establish this. Tracy Hall-Groos will be responsible for liaising with parents/whanau around this... she will be in touch! Other support will be needed over time to assist teachers with learning in classrooms and we will be grateful for any assistance that parents/whanau may like to be involved in through this.

ERO report

The draft report from ERO arrived in our school this week. We have fifteen days to look at this and negotiate any wording we may like to alter. When the final report comes in, we will hold a community meeting to share this with you and discuss the implications for the school. The new style ERO reports are shorter and written with the school community in mind.

Newsletter and notices

Communication between the school and its community is important and newsletters and school notices are part of the way we keep families/whanau informed about what is happening at school. I have over the term noticed that families are inundated with these forms of communication and feedback from a number of parents about how difficult this is to manage at times has meant we have discussed this as a staff and come up with some guidelines around this to try to make this easier for families.

Once a fortnight, on a Thursday, the school newsletter will continue to be available to families via email/website and, for a few families, via hardcopy. Staff will endeavour to include as much information in the newsletter as they can. All sports notices will go out on Tuesday and any other notices need to go out on Monday. All other days of the week you should be free of correspondence! Occasionally the organisation of other places impacts on whether we can do this. However, we will try to keep any variance from Monday, Tuesday and Thursday to a minimum.

Bus Students

We are pleased to advise that the new procedures that have been put in place for those students who travel on the bus are working very well. These procedures have helped us identify exactly what day/s children travel on the bus and also aid in keeping them safe.

If there are any changes to the days that your child currently travels home on the bus for Term 2, please visit our website and complete the '*Bus Travel Notification Form*' indicating what days they will be catching the bus for Term 2. Also, as mentioned in our previous newsletter there is also the facility for parents to notify the school if there is a change in their daily bus travel plans – i.e. '*Casual Bus Booking Form*', '*Not travelling on Bus*' Form. Please notify the school prior to 12 o'clock mid day of any changes. Many thanks.

Head Lice

We have been informed that a number of children have Head-lice. Head lice are highly contagious and we would recommend that you check your child's hair on a regular basis, preferably daily if your child has had a recent outbreak of head lice (it only takes one live egg to be left in the hair for the reproduction cycle to begin again). If your child does become infected please treat them promptly for all our sakes!

This fortnight we are asking for 'Material Scraps and Christmas / Birthday Cards'. When these items are brought to school, could they be left in the Brown Shed, just inside the door – they will then be sorted into the correct containers, At the beginning of Term 2 it will be 'Paper and Tiny Clean Boxes'. 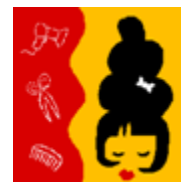
